## QUERCUS alba 'White' Oak





Height: 60' in urban areas-150' in woodlands

Spread: 60'+

Shape Wide spread in open spaces

Foliage: Alternate, simple, 4"-9" long, 5-9 rounded, entire lobes. Bright-green above,

gray-green monoecious, male in catkins, female in solitary to many-flowered

spikes in leaf axils

Fall Color: Purple-red, showy. Color develops late. Color is long lasting

Hardiness: 3-9

Comments: Shade tree for large open spaces. One of the most attractive oaks. Long-lived

(up to 600 years) and very desirable hardwood. Large, deciduous tree, 60 to 80' tall (in urban conditions), as wide or wider than tall, pyramidal when young. Rounded, broad-rounded or upright rounded when mature. Branching is irregular and wide spreading; interesting. Plant in Full sun in deep, moist, rich,

well-drained neutral to acidic soils.
